



Georgia

Farm to school is a common sense approach to child nutrition and community economic development and is uniquely designed to address the ways in which each of these rates intersects with one another through policy, programming, and partnerships. In Georgia, the childhood obesity rate is 16.5%,¹ the food insecurity rate is 14.9%,² and the rate of students receiving free and reduced-price meals is 62.4%;³ farm to school can be used to address these issues. In addition, studies show that every dollar spent on local food can generate up to an additional \$2.16 in economic activity,⁴ indicating school districts' local food purchases can lead to over \$1 billion in local economic activity over one school year.⁵

USDA Farm to School Census (School Year 2013-14) in Georgia

The U.S. Department of Agriculture tracks farm to school activities at the state and school district level.

Georgia invested \$40,647,400 in local foods, with the average school district spending 17% of their budget on local products.

- 84% Vegetables
- 90% Fruit
- 22% Milk
- 28% Meat or Poultry

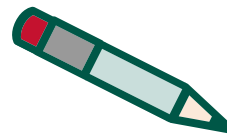
Georgia ranks 19 out of 50 states in local food purchasing.

There is demand for farm to school in Georgia:

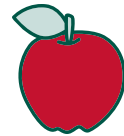
19% of districts surveyed plan to start farm to school activities in the future.

68% of districts surveyed plan to increase local food purchases in the future.

62% of Georgia school districts report participation in farm to school.

In Georgia, 63% of school districts are engaging preschool children in farm to school activities, and 45% of school districts are using local foods in summer meals.

Federal Support for Georgia Farm to School

The USDA administers the Farm to School Grant program, which has awarded the funds to the following organizations in Georgia:

2018 - Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning (\$18,750), Georgia Department of Education (\$24,000).

**Between FY 2013 - FY 2018, Georgia was awarded 13 of 69 grant requests.
Funds awarded total \$888,375 of \$5,283,803 requested.**
